



# Addressing Literacy Gaps in Adolescents: Teaching Foundational Literacy Skills in Every Lesson

## Course Syllabus

### Course Description

As reading materials become more complex, the gaps in students' foundational literacy skills become evident. Ensuring that every adolescent acquires foundational literacy skills, despite their grade and age, is a challenging but an essential task. This course covers explicit instruction techniques to address varying abilities, ensuring lessons are accessible to all and that students make sufficient progress in their reading and writing skills.

What do we do when students lack the basic skills required for more complex comprehension, syntax, vocabulary, grammar, and writing lessons? This course teaches you exactly how to address this in every lesson through the implementation of systematic, cumulative, and explicit instruction in reading and writing to ensure success for each student. Through a hands-on online course, meaningful peer discussions, and provided strategies, participants will gain ready-to-use strategies, lesson plans, modification ideas, and accommodations.

Additionally, educators will learn to use quick diagnostic screeners to assess individual students' needs, allowing for tailored instruction that addresses specific literacy gaps. By the end of this course, educators will be equipped with the skills and resources needed to bridge literacy gaps, promote academic success, and foster confidence in their students.

### Course Objectives

At the end of this course you should be able to:

1. Identify which students are more likely to have literacy gaps and explain the importance of addressing and bridging these gaps.
2. Gather and create baseline data measures, feel prepared to administer these pre-assessments, and feel confident interpreting the results to inform and tailor instruction to address the specific reading and writing needs in your class(es).
3. Explain the importance of vocabulary and the explicit instruction of word meanings so that students can apply new vocabulary in both their spoken and written language.
4. Implement strategies to improve text understanding for all students while ensuring higher-level thinking skills for students who require modified reading materials (complexity and/or length).
5. Design structured writing lessons that guide students through the stages of the writing process (planning, drafting, editing) that are appropriately differentiated to ensure all students can successfully transfer their thoughts and ideas to paper.



6. Plan and integrate syntax, grammar, and spelling instruction in both reading and writing lessons.
7. Integrate multisensory approaches and leverage technology tools to support literacy development.
8. Assess and monitor student progress in literacy and adjust instruction accordingly.
