



COLLECTIONS

University Libraries' collections are strengthened and enhanced through generous donations of books, periodicals, and other items given by faculty, students, alumni, authors, and others. Many of the 105 donations totaling over 6,000 items received within the last academic year are noteworthy. For example, a 50-year run of "Automobile Quarterly" published between 1962 and 2012 was donated by Ron Spencer of Aston, PA. The quarterly is notable for quality writing and its coverage of automotive history, technology, and art. Researchers and browsers will find the beautifully illustrated periodical informative and enjoyable. Find this series in the periodicals section of the Eli M. Oboler Library.

Also of note: the Center for Basque Studies at University of Nevada has donated an average of two books per year for the last 18 years that cover all aspects of Basque culture and history. Interesting titles received this year are "Tree of Gernika: Complete Poems," "Visions of a Basque American Westerner," and "LGBTQI+ in the Basque Country."



ROAR 1199

During the fall 2021 and spring 2022 semesters, librarians participated in teaching ROAR 1199. Fourteen librarians visited the classroom weekly, taught students in the library, and graded a few of their assignments during the eight-week information-literacy portion of the class. Librarians co-taught 17 fall semester and two spring semester

ROAR 1199 serves as a first-year seminar class designed to introduce students to college life.

TEXTBOOK HEROES AT OPEN ED WEEK

Textbook Heroes are members of the ISU community who have promoted or adopted low-cost or free course materials, which helps ISU students save on the cost of course materials and shows an outstanding commitment to student retention and success. The Textbook Heroes initiative was launched in fall 2020 by the University Libraries as a way to express appreciation for those working to make course materials more affordable.

During ISU Open Education Week in March 2022, the Libraries, along with ASISU Student Government, and the ITRC, hosted a series of online presentations in which four 2021 Textbook Heroes shared their experiences integrating OER materials into their courses.

Idaho State University Libraries honored the following faculty members as 2021 Textbook Heroes:




BOOK SALE



PARK DIGITAL COLLECTION NOW AVAILABLE

March 1, 2022, marked the 150th anniversary of Yellowstone National Park. In celebration of this major milestone, Special Collections and Archives has launched two exhibits – one physical, the other digital. The physical exhibit is available for viewing on the first

floor administrative suite of the Oboler Library; the digital exhibit can be accessed at: **cdm16942.contentdm. oclc.org**. Items in the exhibits come from 17 manuscript collections and the Rare Books Collection kept in the Special Collections and Archives department of the Eli M. Oboler Library.

1880 & 1900 IDAHO CENSUS DATA PROJECT AVAILABLE DIGITALLY

In an effort to make historical data more available for research, history students from across the state worked for years on transforming print records from early Idaho censuses into easily accessible digital form. The 1880 and 1900 Idaho Census Data project began circa 1975 when students in ISU's history department began putting the information contained in the Idaho Territorial Census for 1880 into machine-readable format.

In 1989, awards from the State Board of Education of the Higher Education Research Council and the History Committee of the Idaho Centennial Commission facilitated the coding of the 1880 census and began the task of coding the 1900 census. This endeavor involved not only ISU students, but also those at the University of Idaho, Boise State University and Albertson College. For many years, this project was accessible through the ISU history department's website, but became unusable when the University later updated its website management system.

Dr. Ron Hatzenbuehler, ISU Emeritus Professor of History, brought this situation to the library's attention. Ryan Tomlinson, Library Information Systems Administrator, saw possibilities in reformatting the original files and getting this project back online and accessible. The project now resides within the Library's website and can be accessed from several points, including Special Collections and Archives: isu.edu/library/library/library/subject guides, including those for history, special collections, family history, and government information.
