As we wrap up, You'll examine what it means to use AI thoughtfully and ethically in your own teaching balancing innovation with responsibility. Along the way, You'll build a toolkit that helps you work smarter and support deeper learning for every student.

This course empowers educators to integrate AI confidently into their teaching practice. By focusing on practical applications and ethical use, teachers will walk away with new tools, new confidence, and a clearer vision for supporting diverse learners in a changing world.

- 5. Apply AI tools to enhance both formative and summative assessments in social studies, provide timely and meaningful feedback that fosters student growth.



6. Identify and analyze emerging AI technologies relevant to civics and history education, evaluate their potential impact on citizenship, democratic participation, and public life.
