Course Description

What do a revolutionary tea party, a handwritten declaration, a student-led protest, and a community service project have in common? They're all part of the 250-year journey of America's core values—in action! In this hands-on, minds-on course, students will explore the bold ideas that sparked a nation and trace how those values have been challenged, expanded, and reimagined from 1776 to today. Through interactive simulations, creative projects, historical deep-dives, and modern-day connections, learners will investigate how these foundational values live on—not just in documents, but in daily decisions and civic action.

This course enhances classroom teaching effectiveness and supports improved student outcomes by introducing new knowledge in U.S. History. It's a celebration of who we are, how far we've come, and the powerful role each of us plays in shaping what comes next. Because when we understand our values, we don't just study history—we make it.

Course Objectives

At the end of this course you should be able to:

- 1. Identify and analyze key American values as they appear in foundational documents and historical movements.
- 2. Explain the historical development of values in the U.S. and their evolving interpretations.
- Analyze how core American values relate to current issues in the United States.
- 4. Evaluate how constructive disagreement and informed activism sustain democracy and advance justice and equality by applying fact-checking strategies to identify and counter misinformation and by analyzing case studies that connect student activism to core American values.
