What To Do When the Novelty Wears Off?

A letter from UHP Acting Director Alex Bolinger

You may have heard someone say about a newly married couple that for them, "the honeymoon is over." That phrase refers to that point when the initially ecstatic but ultimately unsustainable newness of a relationship dies down. Whereas adrenaline from the novelty of a relationship might carry a couple for the first few months, over time most couples come to a realization that living together involves work and cannot simply be sustained by excitement.

Why would I mention something like this in the Honors Program Weekly Update? I sometimes think of the phrase "the honeymoon is over" when I think of the start of the spring semester of a school year. art of the spring semester of a school year.

I don't know about you, but for me the fall semester is filled with excitement. You can almost feel the buzz of anticipation in the air from incoming students who are beginning their first classes at ISU. The weather is warm and people are often outside playing volleyball, Ultimate Frisbee, or soccer on the Quad or Cadet Field under the lights. I look forward to hearing the marching band practicing outside of Holt Arena and watching students climb to the summit of Red Hill to gaze at another beautiful Pocatello sunset. The novelty of a new beginning is unmistakable.

In contrast, the novelty of the new school year has begun to wear out by the beginning of the spring semester. It does not help that the semester starts in the dead of winter. Each year, I find myself asking a similar question: If the excitement of any new thing ultimately wears out (i.e., if the honeymoon always ends eventually), then what can you do to reclaim your motivation?

I want to suggest at least two ideas. First, if the tangibility of the anticipation of what is to come is part of what makes new beginnings so exciting, then part of the letdown is the lack of things to look forward to. If you are in the Honors Program, I encourage you to keep your eyes open this spring semester for several very exciting service, leadership, mentoring, and social opportunities.

Among the many opportunities that you will see in the pages of the Weekly Update this week and in the weeks to come, one of the especially exciting things is the return of Opportuni-Tea on Saturday, April 2. Opportuni-Tea is not only our biggest single fundraiser to support Honors student scholarships, but it is also a unique chance for the community to meet many of you and find out what the Honors Program is all about.

Second, one of the major culprits of the "novelty wearing off" feeling is the realization that reality sometimes falls short of expectations. Especially in your first year of college, you have probably experienced some sort of reality check where your expectations were different from the outcomes.

One of the best ways to counteract the expectations-versus-outcomes gap is to find things for which you are grateful. I want to thank you all again for your participation in the Gratitude Challenge last September, which allowed us to blow away our goal of 400 letters of gratitude during the month. (Final tally: 519 letters!) This semester, the Honors Program and

the ISU Alumni Association will be compiling a collection of letters and statements of gratitude from last fall to incorporate into a book. (More details will be forthcoming.) Regardless of the time of year or circumstances, gratitude is an amazing opportunity for reframing. Now may well be the right time to revisit the things for which you find the most gratitude, particularly if you are feeling a little bit down right now.

I want you to know that the novelty of getting to work with talented, creative, and hard-working students in the ISU Honors Program this year has not worn off for me. I am looking forward to another great semester. – Dr. B.

Contracting Courses for Honors Credits

For those of you who are planning to contract one (or more) of your courses this semester, the deadline to complete and submit your Honors contract for approval is Monday, January 24th by 5:00 p.m. (the add/drop deadline for ISU for Spring 2022). You need to complete the Honors Online Contract Submission Form found at isu.edu/honors/current-students/honors-curriculum-and-courses/contract/, which requires the following two attachments:

- A copy of the course syllabus.
- A copy of the Honors contract that you agreed to with the instructor. To make your life easier, we have put together an Honors Contract Template (see also attached to this email) that you can fill out with approval from your instructor and turn in before/by January 24th.

For access to the Honors Contract Online Submission Form, as well as more information about contracting a course for Honors credit, please see our UHP website at isu.edu/honors. Here are a few mistakes to avoid:

- Failing to use the Honors Contract Template for your Honors contract. Your contract should not only specify what the Honors activity/assignment will involve and how it will be factored into your final grade, but you and the faculty members should also agree on accountability that is, deadlines for rough drafts or at least one check-in with the instructor about halfway through the semester to make sure that you are on track (and that everyone is on the same page with expectations, etc.).
- Not approaching the instructor early enough. I would recommend that you contact your
 instructor either this week (e.g., via email) or chat with them before or after your very first class
 meeting next week to let them know that you are interested in setting up an Honors contract
 for their course. My experience is that faculty typically appreciate advance notice and waiting
 until the second week of the semester makes it harder to get everything completed by the
 deadline.
- Not asking for help if you run into obstacles. If you encounter any challenges along the way,
 please don't hesitate to contact me at alexbolinger@isu.edu. I would be happy to help in any
 way that I can, including brainstorming ideas, etc. The sooner you let me know, the more
 options we will have.
