# Playing the Long Game

### A letter from UHP Acting Director Alex Bollinger

Like me, I suspect that many of you have been following the events in Ukraine over the past few days. It has been jarring, in this age where warfare is often virtual or even cyber, to watch a nation like Russia openly invade its neighbor to the west with tanks, bombs, and troops on the ground. In fact, some people have lamented that the scene looks like a return to the '80s.

They are referring to the Cold War between the West and the Soviet Union during the 1980s, of course. On a more personal note, though, the events of this past week have reminded me of the 1880s. That was the decade when my great-great-grandmother was born in the city of Odessa (now in western Ukraine). Her family was from eastern Germany and moved to the Black Sea region near Odessa at the invitation of Catherine the Great, the Empress of Russia in the late 1700s. Catherine, a German by birth, signed a decree in 1763 to invite German farmers to move to the western lands of Russia (now Ukraine) to farm the rich, black, fertile soil.

From what I can infer from family records, members of my family probably lived and farmed near Odessa for much of the 1800s. But a shifting political and economic environment, as well as the deadly Russian flu

pandemic in 1889 (which some scientists think may have been a type of coronavirus), probably helped to convince my family to leave the Black Sea region and migrate to the United States. It turned out to be a good decision. While my great-grandparents eventually found stability as farmers in Pleasant Valley, Idaho (near American Falls), I can only imagine that some of my relatives who stayed behind in Ukraine or East Germany may have faced exile, captivity, deprivation, or even starvation during the trying years of World War I and World War II.

I am afraid that I don't have much in the way of profound insights to share about the dynamics of the situation today; I will leave that to the experts. However, in reflecting on my own family's connection to Ukraine in light of the events of the past week, I have begun to appreciate how much my great-great-grandparents' decision to move to the United States has positively influenced my life.

Leaving what is now the Ukraine to move to the United States could not have been an easy decision. In the Black Sea region, my great-great-grandparents had been farming some of the most productive land in the entire world. In Pleasant Valley, they had to contend with land that was covered with sagebrush and lava rock. They had to protect their crops from hordes of

hungry jackrabbits. They had to withstand the worry of summers that sometimes brought very little rain. On top of all of that, they were coming to a new land where they did not speak the language and really only had each other to lean on. Yet in retrospect, my entire family (for generations!) has benefited enormously from their decision.

It begs the question: What decisions will you make in your life that will affect, for good or bad, the lives of the people connected to you? One decision in particular comes to my mind. As Dr. Hunt, the Dean of the College of Business, likes to say, by going to college and earning your degree you are not only

positioning yourself for success. You are also setting up your children and grandchildren for greater opportunities and better lives.

If you have ever wondered whether what you are doing today in your classes is really making a difference, I encourage you to take the long view. Looking back, I have no doubt that you will find that your persistence in doing the hard work and making the sacrifices necessary to earn your degree will pay off. And who knows, you just might be surprised by how many people down the road (some of whom you might never have the chance to meet) will be grateful for what you have done.
